Congratulations to Dr. John Church, BC Innovation Chair in Cattle Industry Sustainability, recipient of the <u>2016 Graduate Research Mentor Award</u> in recognition of his demonstrated excellence mentoring graduate student researchers over a sustained period of time. Church joined TRU in 2008, and has supervised or co-supervised seven graduate students in that time, three of whom have graduated with their Master of Environmental Science degree.

Jared Maida, MSc, took first place in TRU's third annual Three Minute Thesis competition. The Master of Science in Environmental Science student's presentation, "Dealing with Disturbance: How do Rattlesnakes Cope with Change," captured the attention of judges, which included Kamloops Mayor Peter Milobar, Western Canada Theatre General Manager Lori Marchand, and B100 Morning Show host Cheryl Blackwell. The venue was filled to capacity for the event, which saw MBA student Tanya Thomas awarded Second Place and People's Choice for her presentation. Maida received a \$1,000 prize, and will now represent TRU at the Western Canadian 3MT, hosted by UBC-Okanagan on April 29.

Research story recognized as among 25 best in Canada



Ryland Fortie, a fourth year visual arts student, is one of the <u>Top</u> 25 finalists in the <u>Social Sciences and Humanities Research</u> Council (SSHRC) 2016 Storytellers challenge. The annual contest asks post-secondary students to demonstrate — in three minutes or 300 words — how SSHRC-funded research is making a difference in the lives of Canadians. Fortie's video, <u>The Camera Obscura Project: Optics</u>, <u>Learning and Play in Canada's</u>

<u>Wilderness</u>, details his journey as a research assistant on the project, which is led by Visual Arts Professor Donald Lawrence. Fortie receives a prize of \$3,000 and moves on to compete in the Storyteller's Showcase at the <u>2016 Congress of the Humanities and Social Sciences</u> in Calgary in May.

International tourism conference at TRU this summer


New centre of excellence in nursing education launched



TRU is in the process of launching two new research centres, part of a concerted effort to accelerate the implementation of the university's five priorities, and its Strategic Research Plan. Last winter, a call went out soliciting proposals for new Groups and Centres. Following an extensive adjudication process, two new groups were selected. One of the two new centres, the Collaboratory for Educational Research and Development in Nursing. is spearheaded by Dr. Noeman Mirza, Assistant Professor in the School of Nursing. The Collaboratory will receive \$10,000 in start up funds, with Mirza also provided a course release to assist in developing the centre

and securing external funds within the first year of operations.

Research project tackles student outcomes

Dr. Victoria Handford, Assistant Professor in the Faculty of Education and Social Work, is part of a research team that recently received a \$75,000 grant from the British Columbia School Superintendents Association (BCSSA) to conduct quantitative and qualitative research into how BC school districts and their leaders can improve student outcomes. The research team includes Handford, along with Faculty of Education and Social Work Dean Airini, and Dr. Kenneth Leithwood from the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education at the University of Toronto. The research aligns with similar research being undertaken across Ontario. Dr. Leithwood will speak at TRU on May 16 on change leadership. Funding Updates & Opportunities

Research Prospecting Guide: Featured opportunities

- Connect Grant: This grant helps establish new contacts with companies and other knowledge end-user communities to form new partnerships. The deadlines are ongoing, and up to \$25,000 is available
- Killam Research Fellowship: These awards provide support to scholars of exceptional
 ability who are engaged in research projects of broad significance and widespread
 interest. The fellowships provide two years of release time from teaching and
 administrative duties to individual scholars who wish to pursue independent research. The
 deadline to apply is May 15, 2016.
- The Vancouver Foundation's Field of Interest Grants can be used to fund projects that
 work toward meaningful outcomes in: arts and culture, education and training,
 environment, health and social development. The deadline to apply is May 15, and up to
 \$50,000 per year is available.

Access to Research Data Centres Program

This is not a funding opportunity, but an opportunity to gain access to research data needed to conduct large projects that have several sub-projects on related themes. Researchers must submit a proposal for the approval of the overall research program. Once approved, they may submit an application for specific projects (project summary) that fall under the umbrella of the program of research description.

Canada Council for the Arts: Grants to Aboriginal Peoples: Creation Grants for Writers and Storytellers

Deadline to apply: May 1, 2016

The objectives of these grants are to encourage the artistic development of aspiring and professional Aboriginal writers and storytellers, encourage the development of Aboriginal publishers and help to increase appreciation for Aboriginal literature in Canada. The program has two components, one for Creation Grants for Writers and Storytellers, and another for publishers.

Grants are valued at between \$5,000 to \$10,000.

Grand Challenges Explorations

Deadline to apply: May 11, 2016

This initiative encourages innovation and unconventional global health and develoment solutions, is accepting grant proposals. Initial grants will be \$100,000 (USD) each, and projects showing promise will have the opportunity to receive additional funding of up to \$1 million (USD). Two-page proposals are being accepted online for the following topic: Novel Approaches to Characterizing and Tracking the Global Burden of Antimicrobial Resistance.

Sloan Research Fellows

Deadline to apply: Sept. 15, 2016

Funded by the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, this opportunity provides \$55,000 for two years for "any activity supportive of the fellow's research, including equipment, technical assistance, professional travel or trainee support." Early career scientists in chemistry, computer science, economics, math, neuroscience, ocean sciences, physics, computational and evolutionary molecular biology and associated fields will be considered. Candidates must hold tenure track, with a PhD awarded on or after September 2010. Candidates must be nominated by their department head, or another senior researcher.
