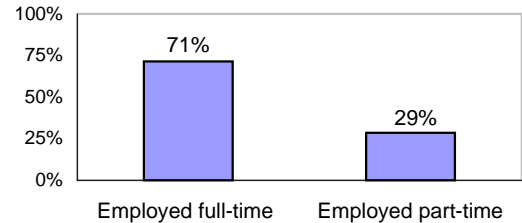

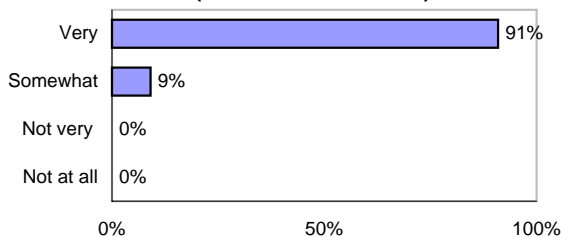
### Of Employed Respondents Either Employed Full- or Part-Time: N=14

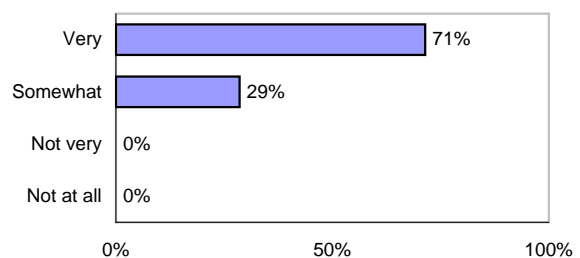
## Usefulness of Studies

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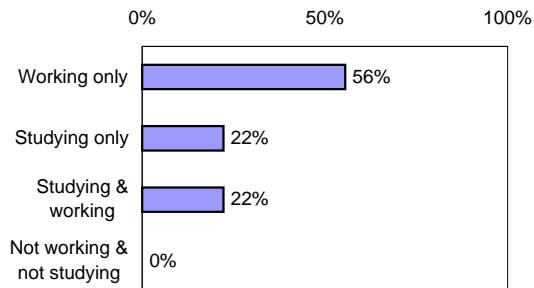

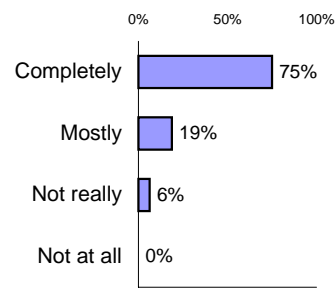

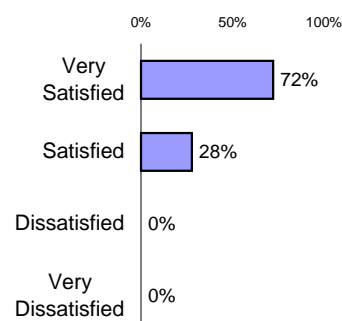
### Overall Satisfaction

#### Was Main Reason for Enrolling Met?



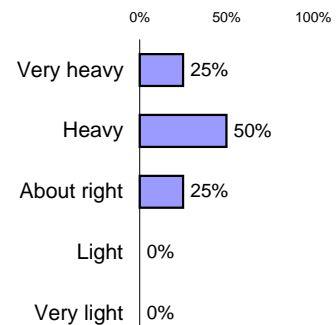

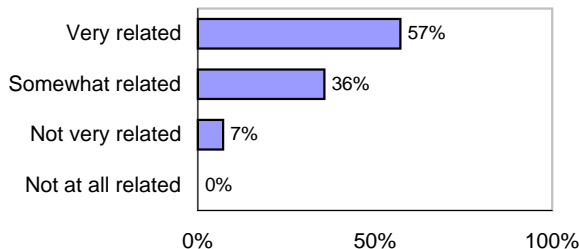

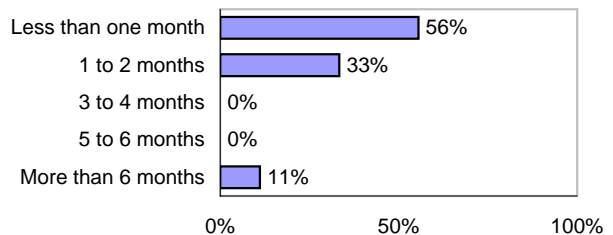
Of Those Currently Employed:
