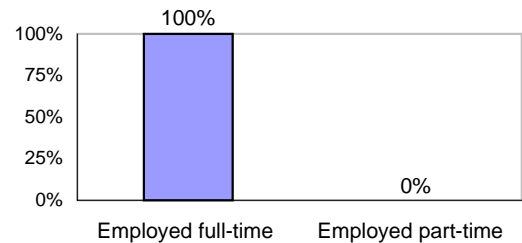

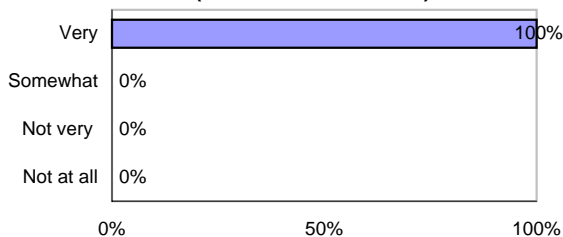

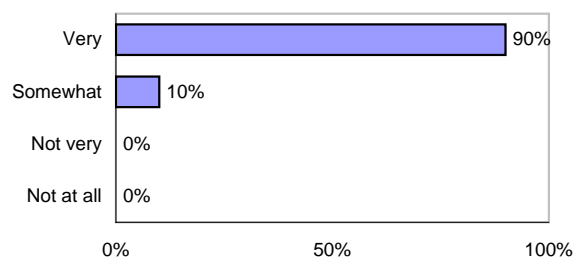
Usefulness of Studies

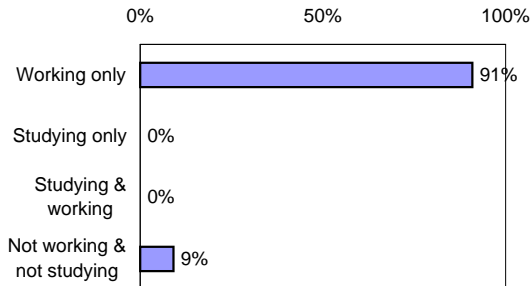

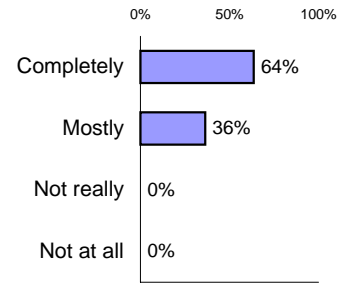

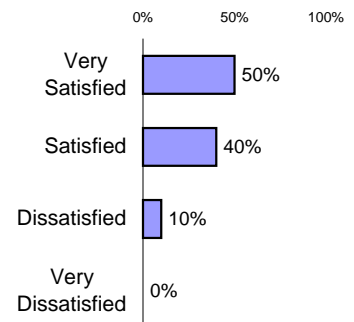
Overall Satisfaction

Was Main Reason for Enrolling Met?



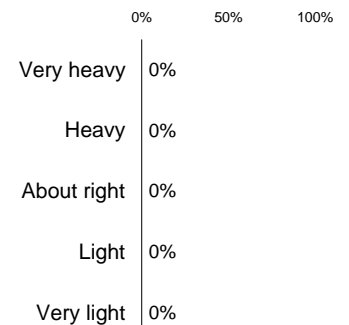

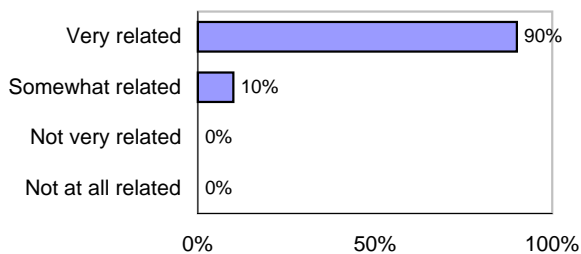

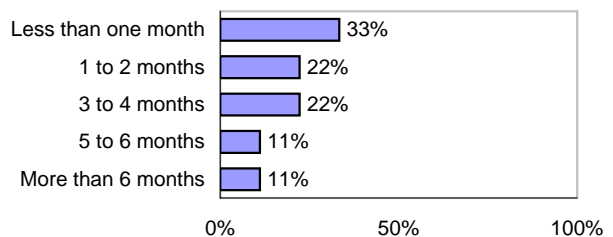
Of Those Currently Employed:
