SSHRC Accelerator Fund opens

Applications are now being accepted for the <u>SSHRC Accelerator Fund</u>. This fund is designed to support SSHRC-eligible researchers in the development of successful applications for SSHRC funding competitions in the 2017-18 year. Funding of up to \$2,500 is available to support activities that will enhance grant proposals.

Updates to 2016 SSHRC competitions

There have been several updates made to 2016 SSHRC competitions, including a module for the applicant's self-identification as Aboriginal in the application form, thereby allowing SSHRC to track and assess participation and success rates for Indigenous doctoral and postdoctoral applicants. SSHRC has also embarked on two new Joint Intiatives as part of the Talent and Insight programs. For the Talent Program, SSHRC has partnered with the Centre for International Governance Innovation's International Law Research Program. For the Insight Program, SSHRC has partnered with the Defence Research and Development Canada. New international travel pre-authorization

TRU's Finance Department has developed a new, streamlined pre-authorization process for international travel, which includes a new <u>International Travel Pre-Authorization Request Form</u> to eliminate duplicate authorization requests for travel advance/expense claims for international travel, and satisfy the university's risk requirements/obligations through executive pre-authorization. Anyone planning to travel outside Canada as a TRU employee must have the new form signed by the president or appropriate vice-president in advance, or you will not be reimbursed for international travel expenses.

Tri-Agencies adopt Statement of Principles on Digital Data Management

Canada's three federal research granting agencies — the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC), and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada (SSHRC) — have adopted the <u>Tri-Agency Statement of Principles on Digital Data Management</u> as an important step towards strenthening research data management in Canada and maintaining Canada's research

excellence. The statement outlines the agencies' overarching expectations for research data managementand the roles of researchers, research institutions, research communities, and research funders in supporting data management.

Dr. Rod McCormick, BC Innovation Council Chair in Aboriginal Health, was one of 50 researchers invited to participate in the emergency meeting in Ottawa on July 13, designed to address concerns related to the grant application and peer review process of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR). The meeting, which was called by Minister of Health Jane Philpott, was extremely fruitful, said McCormick, who, as co-chair of the Aboriginal Health Research Steering Committee, advocated for Indigenous researchers, as well as for researchers at small universities. <u>Read more...</u>

Funding Updates & Opportunities

Research Prospecting Guide: Featured opportunities

- Insight Grants: Funding is available to both emerging and established scholars for longterm research initatives of three to five years. SSHRC welcomes applications involving <u>Aboriginal research</u>, as well as those involving <u>research-creation</u>. The value of this award ranges from \$7,000 to \$400,000 over five years, and the deadline is **Oct. 15, 2016**. Results are announced in spring 2017.
- <u>NSERC Research Tools and Instruments Grants Program</u>: The RTI Grants Program provides the primary avenue for university researchers in the natural sciences and engineering to obtain up to \$150,000 in support for research tools and instruments with a net cost of \$7,001 and \$250,000. TRU has a quota for two RTI applications. A peer-review process is used to pre-select the two applications for the national competition. Application deadline for pre-selection is Aug. 15. The full application deadline is Oct. 25.
- <u>SSHRC Partnership Development Grants</u>: These proposals are expected to respond to the objectives of the <u>Insight</u> program or the <u>Connection</u> program, or a combination thereof. Partnership Development Grants (PDG) are intended for larger teams working in formal collaboration between postsecondary institutions and/or organizations of various types. The value of this award is between \$75,000 to \$200,000 over three years, and the deadline to apply is **Nov. 30, 2016**. Results are announced in March 2017.

CIHR Travel Awards

Deadline: July 26, 2016 Funding: \$500 (minimum)

Through the Institute Community Support (ICS) Program, the Canadian Institute of Health Research (CIHR) is launching the ICS Travel Awards competition for students, postdoctoral fellows, new investigators and knowledge users to present their own research at national and international meetings and/or conferences. The total amount available for this opportunity is \$271,000.

<u>CIHR Knowledge Synthesis Grant: Strategy for Patient-Oriented</u> <u>Research, Primary and Integrated Health Care Innovations Network</u> Deadline: July 26, 2016

Funding: Maximum of \$25,000 for one year, with matching funds from non-federal sources

The objective of this funding opportunity is to support cross-jurisdictional teams of researchers and knowledge users to produce knowledge syntheses or scoping reviews relevant to the priorities of the Primary and Integrated Health Care Innovations (PIHCI) Network that will contribute to the use of synthesized evidence in decision-making and practice across multiple jurisdictions.

National Centre for Responsible Gaming: Seed Grants

Deadline: Aug. 1, 2016

Funding: Up to \$30,000 (USD)

The NCRG supports pilot/feasibility studies, secondary analyses of existing data, small research projects, development of research methodology and development of new research technology relating to the causes, prevention and treatment of gambling disorders. Projects must be complete within one year.

Vancouver Foundation Health and Social Development, Test and Grow Grants

Deadline: (Stage 1) Aug. 5, 2016

Funding: Test Grant, up to \$75,000/year up to three years; Grow Grant, up to \$50,000/year for up to three years

Proposals develop social innovations to create systemic changes that support and encourage the ability of adults, families and communities to create healthy, caring, safe and supportive environments for all members of the community. Test grants support teams with well-developed timelines of activities and budgets that reflect the project team's demonstrated knowledge of what is needed to have an impact on one of the broad outcomes associated with Vancouver Foundation's fields of interest. Grow Grants are longer-term grants to help project teams scale an existing and successful social innovation to new geographic areas, new levels of systems of institutions, or to embed the social innovation further within existing levels of systems or institutions.

Ken Lepin Award for graduate students

Deadline: Aug. 15, 2016

Funding: \$5,000

Five awards valued at \$5,000 each are available to students entering or continuing in TRU's graduate programs. These awards are available to financially assist students who are entering their first or second year of full-time graduate studies programs for those studying on campus or online. The awards will be given on the basis of outstanding academic achievement in course work and research, taking into account leadership activities.

Office of the Privacy Commissioner: Pathways to Privacy series

Deadline: Aug. 15, 2016

Funding: Up to \$50,000 (maximum)

The OPC is inviting academic institutions and not-for-profit organizations, including industry associations and trade associations, eligible under its <u>Contributions Program</u> to submit proposals to organize and host an event to be held between January 15 and March 31, 2017. The proposed event should put a strong emphasis on innovation, in terms of both format and themes. The content should prominently feature previously funded projects under the Contributions Program and address one or more of the OPC's privacy priorities: Economics of Personal Information, Government Surveillance, Reputation and Privacy, and Body as Information.

Mitacs Elevate

Deadline: Aug. 24, 2016

Funding: \$55,000 annually (plus \$7,500 per year in non-cash value training) Applications are now being accepted for two-year postdoctoral funding. This award provides exclusive, customized professional development training, and establishes a long-term collaborative research project with a non-academic partner.

<u>CIHR Operating Grant: Challenge of Dementia in Indigenous</u> Populations

Deadline: Sept. 6, 2016

Funding: Maximum of \$100,000 annually for five years

This is a joint call from the CIHR, CIHR Institute of Neurosciences, Mental Health and Addiction, and the CIHR Institute of Aboriginal Peoples' Health as part of the CIHR Dementia Research Strategy. The aim of this funding opportunity is to build capacity among Indigenous and non-Indigenous scholars or students in the area of dementia research.

CIHR New Investigatory Salary Award: Clinical Rehabilitation

Deadline: Sept. 13, 2016

Funding: \$155,000 (maximum) over three years

This award provides recipients the opportunity to develop and demonstrate their independence in initiating and conducting research in the area of rehabilitation sciences through provision of a contribution to their salary. This award is designed to provide protected time for early-career clinical investigators, including allied health professionals, to undertake clinical or translational rehabilitation research. Applicants must be new investigators (0-60 months with a research appointment) and hold recognized training to practice as a health professional.

NSERC: PromoScience

Deadline: Sept. 15, 2016

Funding: \$15,000 to \$25,000 annually

This program offers financial support for organizations working with young Canadians to promote an understanding of science and engineering (including mathematics and technology). PromoScience supports hands-on learning experiences for young students and their science teachers. Grants may be used to cover improvements to program content or delivery, as well as for new programs and activities. Grants can also be used to cover operational costs such as salaries, travel, postage, materials and supplies, provided that they relate to the promotion of science and engineering.

Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) National Contaminants Advisory Group (NCAG) 2016 Call for Proposals

Deadline: Sept. 30, 2016

Funding: \$75,000/year over two to three years; \$100,000/year over one year (maximum)

The NCAG provides scientific information and advice to DFO and other government departments on priority issues related to the biological effects of contaminants on aquatic organisms. One of the group's functions is to fund research on priority contaminants issues. DFO is seeking research proposals that will enhance the Department's scientific knowledge and support evidence-based decision-making on the biological effects of contaminants in four theme areas: aquaculture therapeutants; pesticides; oil and gas; contaminants and issues of emerging concern.
