Congratulations to 2016 Discovery Grant holders

The National Sciences and Engineering Research Council has notified applicants of their successful Discovery Grant proposals, and TRU is pleased to confirm six researchers were successful, which is a huge achievement. A large, public announcement will take place later this spring, when NSERC officially announces the 2016 grant recipients. Research projects supported by Discovery Grants are:

Real Estate Foundation commits \$150,000 towards environmental leadership

The Real Estate Foundation of BC has granted \$150,000 to TRU in support of the creation of an NSERC Industrial Research Chair position. This is the second grant TRU has received in support of



the creation of the NSERC Research Chair position, the first being \$250,000 from Genome BC. Creating an NSERC research chair supports the development of industry-based solutions to environmental problems and puts us one step closer to the creation of a Centre for Ecosystem Reclamation at TRU, the first of its kind in Canada. Dr. Lauchlan Fraser is the candidate for the NSERC Industrial Research Chair.

TRU Research Story featured at SSHRC Congress

Ryland Fortie, a recent Bachelor of Arts graduate, and a research assistant with visual arts professor <u>Donald Lawrence</u>, will present his research in the Storyteller's Showcase at the 2016 Congress of the Humanities and Social Sciences, scheduled for May 28 to June 3 at the University of Calgary. Fortie's video (as seen above), <u>The Camera Obscura Project: Optics</u>, <u>Learning and Play in Canada's Wilderness and the North</u>, was selected from among nearly 200 entries by 30 expert judges in Canada and abroad. The Top 5 Storytellers will be selected at Congress, and will be flown to Ottawa to present their research at the SSHRC Impact Award Ceremony in November.

All My Relations Research Network exists with the goal of developing a national Aboriginal family and community health research and training centre to identify, research and further advance and implement best practices in Aboriginal family and community health and healing. The centre, directed by Dr. Rod_McCormick, BC Innovation Chair of Aboriginal Health, will be designed to deliver training for up to 250 community based mental health facilitators across Canada, serving as a long-term solution for the improvement of Aboriginal mental health outcomes.

SSHRC unveils 2016-20 Strategic Plan

Earlier this month, the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council unveiled its new <u>Strategic Plan: Advancing Knowledge for Canada's Future</u>. The plan articulates the agency's vision for the next four years, and has three strategic objectives:

- To enable excellence in a changing research landscape
- To create opportunities for research and training through collaborative initiatives
- To connect social sciences and humanities research with Canadians

CARA 2016 — a wealth of information

Held in Vancouver earlier this month, the Canadian Association of Research Administrators annual conference was attended by several members of the Research Office, and valuable information was exchanged. Specific information of value to TRU researchers includes:

The 2016 Federal Budget announces ongoing core funding increases:

- \$16 million for SSHRC;
- \$19 million for the Research Support Fund;
- \$30 million each for CIHR and NSERC;
- \$20 million to create two additional Canada Excellence Research Chairs in fields related to clean and sustainable technology

SSHRC Updates:

- Connection Grant holders are now considered eligible under Emerging Researchers for Insight Discovery Grants
- When communicating competition results, the "recommended but not funded," or 4A category has been eliminated, and all applications are collected in a single group, divided by relative rank into sextiles
- Insight Grant applicants will now select a specific adjudication committee from a drop-down menu
- Insight and Insight Development Grant committees will be mainly discipline-based but will include two multidisciplinary committees (humanities/social sciences) and an Aboriginal research committee

NSERC Updates

- It is expected the average grant amount and the success rates for Discovery Grants will increase
- Applicants are now limited to one Engage Grant per fiscal year; Engage Grants applications will now be peer-reviewed
- Canadian companies are now limited to two Engage Grants per fiscal year

CIHR Update

• Funding from the recent federal budget announcement (\$30 million) will be dedicated to the Project Scheme grant program

Nursing research looks to stop bullying before it starts



School of Nursing faculty Michelle Seibel and Dr. Florriann Fehr are using innovative techniques to prevent bullying at its roots, and have recently published an article, "Cognitive Rehearsal Training for Upskilling Undergraduate Nursing Students Against bullying: A Qualitative Pilot Study." The results of the research provide undergraduate nursing students with tools to address workplace bullying. Seibel and Fehr were supported in their research by an Internal Research Grant. Katernick, a Metis student and also a member of the CINA, spoke of her work on a project designed by the TRU School of Nursing and based on the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Call to Action. TRU prof discusses atheism research on CBC Daybreak



Dr. Tina Block, associate professor in history, appeared on CBC Daybreak on May 16 to discuss her research project studying the history of unbelief in Canada. The project explores the experiences of Canadians who denied, doubted or drifted away from religious belief between 1950 and 1979. As part of the project, Block, along with two student research assistants, will spend the summer conducting oral interviews with Canadians born in 1960 or earlier, and who identified as unbelievers, athiests, agnostics, secular humanists or rationalists. Public health research designed to foster healthy schools



Dr. Susan Duncan, professor in the Faculty of Nursing, is working with a team of researchers from TRU, Interior Health and the Kamloops-Thompson School District to implement comprehensive school health initiatives. Supported by a grant from Interior Health, the research project, "Public Health Nursing and Comprehensive School Health," will see researchers work in district elementary schools — rural and urban — to develop Health School Teams, which will then assess the health of each school and establish unique health goals. "There has been a gap in

realizing the public health nurse's full scope of practice as partners with schools and communities to advance health promotion and ultimately chronic disease prevent," said Duncan. Read the full story.

Research Prospecting Guide: Featured opportunities

• <u>Discovery Grants:</u> It's time to begin preparing your 2017 Discovery Applications, as a Notification of Intent to Apply must be submitted by Aug. 1, 2016. The NOI is mandatory, and the information provided in the document allows

NSERC to begin some aspects of the review process. The NOI and the NSERC version of the <u>Canadian Common CV</u> must be submitted using the <u>Research Portal</u>. Please begin this process early, as it can be time-consuming to populate the fields the first time. If you wish to submit an application for a <u>Research Tools and Instruments</u> grant, please contact the <u>Research Office</u> related to the university's internal selection process, as this is quota based.

- Collaborative Research and Development Grants: This NSERC opportunity is intended to give companies that operate
 from a Canadian base access to the unique knowledge, expertise and educational resources available at Canadian
 postsecondary institutions and to train students in essential technical skills required by industry. CRD grants support
 well-defined projects undertaken by university researchers and their private-sector partners. Direct project costs are
 shared by the industrial partner(s) and NSERC.
- Connecting for Canada's 150th: This SSHRC initiative provides support for connection activities that exemplify the
 contributions of Canadian institutions and researchers in the social sciences and humanities, either to a discipline or
 to global fields of study. All applicants must demonstrate how their project addresses this historic anniversary.

Fort McMurray Wildfire: Call for proposals

The Institute for Catastrophic Loss Reduction (ICLR) is now inviting proposals under its Quick Response Program, which allows early career social scientists to quickly deploy to a disaster-affected area in the aftermath of an extreme event to collect perishable data. In addition to expanding academic knowledge, funded researchers submit brief reports that make preliminary analyses of recent events available to ICLR's multidisciplinary network of researchers, practitioners, and educators as well as other interested parties.

The maximum grant amount is \$150,000 for individuals and artist groups/collectives, and \$500,000 for organizations.

Globalink Research Internships pair faculty in Canada with international undergraduates for 12-week research projects from May to September, and the program is now accepting faculty submissions for summer 2017. Top-ranked students travel from Australia, Brazil, China, France, Germany, India, Mexico, Tunisia and Saudi Arabia to participate, and faculty are welcome to submit multiple projects and re-submit projects from previous years.
