TRU fire ant expert discusses first case of associated anaphylaxis



"(Robert) Higgins first confirmed the ant's existence in B.C. in 2010, but he believes it could have lived in the province without drawing attention for 20 years. ... Higgins said it's the density of nests that is likely causing the fire ants to be more aggressive. The stings usually cause welts, but not reactions as extreme as (anaphylaxis). There have been two other confirmed cases that resulted in significant swelling."

Camera Obscura sets off on national touring exhibition



On Aug. 21, a new permanent public artwork was unveiled and a national touring exhibition announced during Donald Lawrence's Prairie Sun Project, hosted by the University of Lethbridge at its Coutts Centre for Western Canadian Heritage in Nanton, AB. Lawrence's latest creation — an 80-year old grain bin-turned camera obscura — was the centre of attention. The event was a kickoff to The Midnight Sun Camera Obscura Project, curated by University of Lethbridge Art Gallery Director Josephine Mills, on exhibit at the University's Main Gallery from until Oct. 20, 2016. Funding Updates & Opportunities

Research Prospecting Guide: Featured opportunities

- <u>Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research Convening & Collaborating Awards</u>: These awards build capacity for the development and use of research evidence in practice, policy and further research by promoting knowledge exchange between health researchers and research users. The value of the award is up to \$15,000 for a maximum of 12 months. **Deadline is Oct. 21, 2016.**
- <u>Canada Council for the Arts:</u> A new funding model has been announced, with six new programs for 2017. Each new program hosts a suite of funding opportunities. Until November 2016, most original deadlines remain unchanged.
- Ericsson Canada Inc.: Projects that strengthen Canada's Information and Communications Technology (ICT) ecosystem and enhance its vision of a Networked Society are being solicited. A successful application could see a grant valued at up to \$50,000. Those who wish to submit a proposal must first receive approval from the Office of Research and Graduate Studies. **Deadline for the notice of intent is Oct. 15, 2016.**

Undergraduate Research Apprenticeship Fund

Competition opens: Sept. 19, 2016

Funding: \$3,000 per student

This program is open to faculty members engaged in research, scholarship and creative inquiry to hire an Undergraduate Research Apprentice to assist them in accelerating their research and to provide a meaningful training opportunity. Applications must be initiated by a faculty member, and there are 30 awards available.

New opportunity for post-doctoral fellows in law

Deadline: Sept. 21, 2016

Funding: \$80,500 per year

A new scholarship competition has been launched by the Centre for International Governance Innovation's (CIGI) International Law Research Program (ILRP) in partnership with SSHRC, giving law students the opportunity to advance their research and collaborate with top international law experts. The value of the scholarship is up to \$80,500 per year, plus up to \$18,000 in research allowance, with a duration between 12 and 24 months. Candidates must apply through the <u>SSHRC Postdoctoral Fellowships competition</u>.

Get ready for #BCTech Summit 2017

The 2016 #BCTech Summit offered up opportunities for TRU to <u>showcase its innovative research</u> <u>projects</u>. The next <u>#BCTech Summit</u> takes place March 14-5, 2017 at the Vancouver Convention Centre. Researchers may apply for space in the Research Runway, or for space in the Tech Showcase, which is reserved for large, interactive projects. The deadline to apply for space is **Sept. 28, 2016**. Update to SSHRC Sports Participation Research Initiative

Deadline: Oct. 15, 2016

Funding: Maximum of \$100,000 annually

The Sports Participation Research Initiative target areas posted on the SSHRC website were updated on Aug. 12. This initiative supports the goals of the Canadian Sport Policy by funding selected doctoral students, postdoctoral researchers and postsecondary institution-affiliated researchers to conduct research on matters related to enhancing participation in sport in Canada.

SSHRC Partnership Development Grant competition opens

Deadline: Nov. 30, 2016

Funding: \$75,000 to \$200,000

The PDG program provides support over one to three years to teams/partnerships, led by a project director to develop research and related activities in the social sciences and humanities, and design and test new partnership approaches for research activities that may result in best practices or models that either can be adapted by others.

Canadian Science Policy Fellowship

Funding: \$60,000 to \$80,000 plus a \$5,000 Mitacs award

The fellowship is launching a call for the 2017-18 cohort. Along with funding, Fellows receive customized professional development training, and policy-relevant workshops. This competition is open to all faculty members and postdoctoral fellows. The call for host department projects is open between Nov. 1 to Dec. 30, and the call for fellow applicants, Jan. 17, 2017 to March 24, 2017. Results will be announced in the spring, with fellowships beginning in September 2017.

Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) National Contaminants Advisory Group (NCAG) 2016 Call for Proposals

Deadline: Sept. 30, 2016

Funding: \$75,000/year over two to three years; \$100,000/year over one year (maximum) The NCAG provides scientific information and advice to DFO and other government departments on priority issues related to the biological effects of contaminants on aquatic organisms. One of the group's functions is to fund research on priority contaminants issues. DFO is seeking research proposals that will enhance the Department's scientific knowledge and support evidence-based decision-making on the biological effects of contaminants in four theme areas: aquaculture therapeutants; pesticides; oil and gas; contaminants and issues of emerging concern.
