CYCA 2500 Special Topics

Experiential Youth Leadership - 3 credits

Prerequisites: This courses meets the special topics requirements for the Human Service Diploma program and therefore requires admission to or eligibility to year 1 of the diploma program for those students. Students and practitioners in Education, Social Work and Adventure Guide Training who wish to explore Outdoor Youth Engagement experiences as a component of their practise are also eligible. Students are encouraged to consider the physical requirements of this course before enrolling.

Note: This course involves a 5 day residential component at Educo Adventure School near 100 Mile House as well the Williams Lake classroom time. Cost is \$1000.00 (includes credit course tuition as well as the tuition, accommodation and meals for the Educo portion of the course).

Health Care Ethics (3,0,0) 3 credits

This course examines the ethical role of the health care provider within the Canadian health care system. This course will critically assess a selection of ethically problematic situations with which the health care provider must routinely deal. Some of the issues considered include the relationship among health care providers, care of the elderly, genetic counselling, resource allocation, care of those diagnosed mentally ill, and the ethics of transplantation. These issues will be taken up in light of our exploration of moral theory, common ethical principles, and methodologies arising from interdisciplinary bioethics.

The Cariboo Chilcotin Weekend University Program is a joint initiative whereas UNBC and TRU are working with the Northern Shuswap Tribal Council to provide Accredited Post Secondary courses. During the Fall and Winter semesters, the courses are offered on a part-time basis (alternate weekends) to allow the students to work or raise their families. During the Spring/Summer Session I, due to the limited time frame, the courses run each weekend. During Summer Session II, the courses run on consecutive weekdays. Weekend University is open to the students of the 15 First Nations Bands in the Cariboo Chilcotin and non-Aboriginal students (space permitting - generally available).

PARTNER ASSISTED LEARNING (PAL)

Program Description

Based in Williams Lake, PAL is a community partnership program designed to provide one-to-one adult literacy tutoring to the City and surrounding areas. PAL is located at the Williams Lake Campus of Thompson Rivers University and supports up to 20 adults, from non-readers to Grade 12 level, who have challenges with classroom, online courses, or with the literacy skills needed for everyday life. Scheduling is arranged to suit the learner and the tutoring focuses on their individual needs. Support is also available for those with ESL challenges.
