



# CERTIFICATE IN ABORIGINAL STUDIES

This is a new multi-disciplinary certificate program designed for students interested in studying the culture, literature, history, politics, economics, land and resources of Aboriginal people.

## General Requirements:

1. Grade 12 or equivalent; or mature student status.
2. The completion of at least 24 credits in courses designated as “aboriginal content” courses (some courses may have specific prerequisites).
3. At least 50% of the required course work must have been completed at TRU.
4. Students must apply for the Certificate in Aboriginal Studies by submitting an application form to the Records Office. Convocation ceremonies are held in June.
