#### In favour of theme (18)

- A theme is a nice way to focus the presentations
- Themes are fine, as long as they allow for flexibility, as yours does
- It was good. "The Art of Teaching" [suggestion for future?]
- Good! "Making it Real" applies to all. Keep the same theme for next year?
- Great! Excellent provides focus

### Yes, but... (7)

- Liked it! Restrictive (in terms of sessions...and not all related to it but they didn't need to, to be useful) perhaps plenary applies to theme, rest open?
- Not sure theme was prevalent enough (had to search for it); good idea to have a theme I think it is important for cohesiveness.
- The theme was not connected by the presenters (2)
- Important to think broadly and conceptually about practice
- Yes, but we could try a random one: it may open it to others? ...Random Ideas on teaching and learning?
- Talks didn't seem to connect... theme a good idea, but need to connect to it.
- I like the idea of theme, but it wasn't relevant enough/ made explicit. Now that I'm aware of it, I like it (the student panel fit in well with this)

## Maybe/neutral/indifferent (4)

- Neutral, makes no difference.
- What theme? Place on program outline à OK found it; could do without it (not meaningful to me)
- I think the theme was less clear/incorporated but I am not sure it was critical to overall success of the colloquium.
