Executive Summary

This report contains a detailed statistical analysis of the results to the survey titled *2014 TRU Teaching Practices Colloquium*. The results analysis includes answers from all respondents who took the survey in the 7 day period from Monday, February 17, 2014 to Monday, February 24, 2014. 63 completed responses were received out of 118 invited to yield a 53% response rate.

40 minutes is short if presenters are to include an interactive aspect. Maybe poll the presenters for their take on the time?

Do it twice a year

The format works well - maybe some best practices roundtables would work (four or five professors could discuss their most successful assignment, for example)

Then problem is with the poster session. This session coincides with the lunch. So it is possible to have a 30 minute poster session after the lunch. I am not sure whether any poster presenter received gift this time.

Lunch as round tables around the poster sessions - it could highlight these sessions more. Something with laughter and fun... maybe that even could be a theme?

Longer sessions - maybe even just 10 more minutes.

It was well organized.

Keep up the good work. Each year, the flawless organization is impressive. The TPC is a significant element in TRU's identity. Those presentations that included our students were particularly interesting and useful, I thought. Perhaps you could encourage faculty to consider including students more frequently? In addition, we were told that students had a role in organizing the TPC. It would have been interesting to have those students, and their roles, identified.

Invite more students to participate.

Dr Shaver seems to be relatively uninterested in the event - so it doesn't make sense for him to do the opening address it seems.

It would be great if all the sessions would be video recorded and made available after the conference so that we can review them later and watch the ones we weren't able to attend.

Welcome address was scheduled for 8:30 am, but started at 8:45.

I thought everyone did a great job. The only thing that came up for me was whether arrangements could be made to donate any leftover food to the Food Share program at the end of the day.

I would reconsider the cost - \$35 is getting a little expensive. It also would have been nice to have more than 5 minutes between sessions and to start the wine and cheese immediately following the last session.

I think that the posters should have been after the keynote, during the coffee break. Some of the poster presenters didn't eat lunch and Not enough time to see posters at lunch.

couldn't open the abstracts document from my home computer post schedule at least 3 weeks prior to the event

More posters and some handbills might have made better reminders.

I am hoping that the sessions will be taped so that those who miss the sessions they are interested will get a chance to view them.

Try to convince Culinary Arts to label the vegetarian option! Also, having a buffet is great but there needs to be some assistance provided for disabled people. I got soup for a woman who otherwise wouldn't have been able to get it because last time she burned herself. I just happened to be in line behind her, so it worked out, but she really shouldn't have had to go through the line at all. When I attended an conference on indigenous languages, there were volunteers assigned to serve the elders, and I'd like to see something like that for the TCP.

The registration procedure is too rigid. Allowing only on-line credit card registration does not allow us to pay from our PD funds. It also penalizes those who, for privacy reasons or other, prefer not to give out their credit card information on-line. I registered well in advance, but because I chose to pay cash on the day, I had to pay more, and there was no name tag for me. Hand-written name tags always look like an afterthought. Perhaps it would be possible to have a computer at the registration table to print up late registrant tags on-site.

The one day fits well into my busy work schedule and provides just the right amount of sessions to be able to set goals related to upcoming teaching year. Keynote adds to the learning.

I'd like to have it kept on campus, to keep it an inexpensive PD option.

1. TRU has evolved significantly over the last 12 years; thus, some original guidelines may need updating. For example, one of the strategic goals of TRU now is research. However, research reports related to teaching and learning are "second-class citizens," grouped in the poster session or simply barred. The research office is considering a conference for research purposes. Since funding is always an issue, why not collaborate with Research Office and hold a two-day teaching and scholarship conference, open to the external community too. This will likely appeal to many more people and boost the image of TRU both internally and externally.

I like it fine--as it is now. Always tempting to consider more time--but then, holding this time is already such a challenge.

I was extremely disappointed in the keynote address. Not strong speaker, not dynamic, not inspirational at all and did not seem to complete what he set out to do...

I believe that some of the sessions could be done better... little good information- seemed like a waste of time

The poster sessions need more time- avoid having speakers during lunch; I think it makes their contribution seem diminished.

Lower the cost of participating. \$45 is RIDICULOUS! Stop paying for wine, if you have to, in order to keep the costs down.

Re: 10): An out-of-town location might well make the TPC less attractive: weather and time factors might come into play. As for non TRU-participants, a separate conference might be the answer. The chance for relatively intimate exchange would be lost if the TPC took this approach. Expanding to two

days might remedy the problem of attendees not being able to see sessions they would like to see, but that option should be considered carefully before such a big change is made, as 2 days is a large time commitment.

I did find that the panel sessions sometimes do not allow for information to be shared in a useful way in such a short session: maybe a double session for some panels might be useful. There were a lot of sessions to choose from (five sessions for each of four time slots. While selection is great, it's difficult to choose one.

Registration was difficult. First the first submission there was no send button. My name was not included in 90% of all advertising - therefore a number of faculty were not aware that I was presenting.

I think that changes are needed to revitalize interest in the TPC. Non-TRU participants are a good idea. Perhaps from OK College & UBC- OK, and others

Could departments and faculties be asked to identify themes and topics for specialized or interdisciplinary exploration?

Can't think of any, other than taking more care to meet the needs of persons with disabilities.

The registration process needs to be much more flexible. With this number of registrants (under 200), some flexibility should be possible.
