WHAT'S BEST?

Resume

A **resume** is a brief summary of your skills and experience over one or two pages

Curriculum Vitae (CV)

CV is more detailed and can stretch well beyond two pages

Typically used in Academia and Research based careers



THE BASICS

The curriculum vitae (CV)

- Comprehensive statement of your educational background, teaching, and research experience.
- Standard representation of credentials within academia.





THE BASICS

- •The full CV is usually used when applying for academic positions, tenure and academic promotion.
- •Tailor your CV to the specific rank to which you are applying and place emphasis on key areas (70/30 or 40/40/20)
- •For a bi-partite tenure or promotion, the CV will strongly emphasize teaching/professional role and service.
- •For a tri-partite tenure or promotion, the CV will accentuate research.
- •Format can vary by field, so also seek specific advice from colleagues, and others within your field.
- •No length restrictions for CVs. (10...... page range)





FORMATTING OVERVIEW

•Must be well organized and logical.

•Use an effective format and be consistent.

•Use bolds, italics, underlines, and capitalization to draw attention to key items that match sections in your T and P portfolio

•List all relevant items in chronological order for each section.

•Page numbers are handy for those that print out the T and P package

•Use a running head for all pages

SHOULD I INCLUDE HARD OR SOFT SKILLS?

(TYPICALLY FOR A RESUME FORMAT NOT AN ACADEMIC CV)

Hard skills are specific, teachable abilities that can be defined and measured, such as typing, writing, math, reading and the ability to use software programs.



Soft skills are less tangible and harder to quantify, such as hardworking, getting along with others, listening and engaging in small talk.
