

CIHR opportunity for social science researchers

Deadline: Feb. 28, 2017

Award value: \$25,000 maximum

CIHR has launched a new funding opportunity for social scientists researching population and public health issues.

CIHR Catalyst Grant: Ethics

Deadline: Feb. 28, 2017

Award value: \$50,000 per year, up to two years

The Catalyst Grant funds research that builds capacity in ethics as it applies to health (including health research, health promotion and maintenance, clinical care, population and public health, health systems and services) by encouraging applications from new investigators as well as established investigators new to the field of health ethics.

Canada Council for the Arts: Explore and Create

Deadline: Ongoing

Award value: \$25,000 per year, up to two years

The Research and Creation component of Explore and Create supports the initial stages of

the creative process. Grants provide support for creative research, creation and project development.

Innovation to Commercialization (I2C) Awards

Deadline: LOI March 9, 2017

Award value: \$150,000/annum for two years

The Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research is now accepting applications for the I2C program, which is designed to address priorities and gaps in BC's health research and innovation ecosystem. Each I2C award will support BC health researchers advancing discoveries or inventions toward commercialization by providing funding for feasibility research and commercialization activities.

National Geographic grants

Deadlines: April 1 & July 1, 2017 Award value: \$30,000 maximum

The National Geographic Society awards grants for research, conservation, education and storytelling through its Committee for Research and Exploration. All proposed projects must be novel and exploratory, and be of broad interest. The projects should be bold, innovative and transformative.

Vancouver Foundation Develop Grants

Deadline: Environment and Animal Welfare, April 13, 2017; Health and Social Development, April 28, 2017 Award value: \$10,000

Develop grants are short-term grants to help project teams explore complex social issues and to develop viable projects that might address these issues through social innovation. Project teams will have already begun working on this idea and need further support to move the idea forward to become a viable project plan.

BC Music Fund research grants

Applications evaluated on a rolling basis, ending March 31, 2018

The BCMF Research Program is one of the funding programs of the \$15 million BC Music Fund supported by the Province of BC. This program is designed to grow knowledge and improve sector data for the long-term sustainability of BC's music industry. Projects must demonstrate a collective benefit to BC's music industry.

Funding Updates & Opportunities (students)

Graduate Student Research Mentor

Deadline: March 3, 2017

These awards go to TRU graduate students who are engaged in research and who wish to serve as mentors for undergraduate research, scholarship and creative enquiry. Mentors have the opportunity to work as a team, mentoring students from a variety of majors and backgrounds, pooling resources and collaborating with faculty. Each graduate program has been allotted a minimum of three Mentor awards, valued at \$7,000 each.

Undergraduate Research Ambassadors

Deadline: March 10, 2017

This experience strengthens students' undergraduate research understanding and provides training to enhance skills as ambassadors. Open to students who have at least 60 credits, a GPA of 3.2 or higher, and have engaged in research or creative activities. Successful ambassadors receive a \$3,000 award, and there are 14 awards available.

Mitacs Globalink Research Award

Deadline: March 31, 2017

This award supports research collaborations between Canada and select partner countries, including Brazil, China, France, India, Korea, Mexico and Tunisia. The award is open to graduate and senior undergraduate students. Funding and eligible disciplines vary by destination.
