Student funding

Mitacs Globalink Research Award

Deadline: Nov. 8, 2017

This award funds research collaborations between senior undergraduate and graduate students and faculty members at a university overseas. Eligible projects last between 12-24 weeks and are open to students in all disciplines.

Environmental Science and Natural Resource Science Fellowship Award

Deadline: Nov. 17, 2017

Value: \$7,500; two awards available

This fellowship is available to either senior undergraduate or graduate students, who are selected based on their scholarly achievements, their commitment to research and their demonstrated potential for future contributions to our understanding of the environment.

Canada Graduate Scholarship - Masters

Deadline: Dec. 1, 2017 Award value: \$17,500

TRU offers four CGS-M entrance, one each from the CIHR and NSERC, and two from SSHRC. The application must be completed through the Research Portal, and it is recommended that students start their applications early.

RISE-Globalink Research Internship

Deadline: Dec. 15, 2017

Value: \$5,200

Mitacs and the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) offer this program that provides undergraduate students at Canadian universities with the opportunity to undertake research at eligible German institutions. Canadian students will be paired with a PhD supervisor in Germany for a three-month project. This competition is open to full time undergraduate students in biology, chemistry, physics, earth sciences, or engineering, who have completed at least two years of a four or five year program.

Tri-Agency News

Tri-Agency Financial Administration Guide summary of changes

NSERC, CIHR, SSHRC launched the renewal of the Tri-Agency Financial Administration Guide (TAFAG) in September. The vision for this updated guide is to promote efficiencies, reduce administrative burden, and provide greater flexibility to administering institutions and grant recipients in ensuring the appropriate accountability and use of grant funds.

SSHRC Partnership Development Grant

Deadline: Nov. 13, 2017 (internal); Nov. 30, 2017 (external)

Value: \$75,000 - \$200,000

Partnership Development Grants provide support over one to three years to teams/partnerships, led by a project director, to:

- develop research and related activities in the social sciences and humanities, including knowledge mobilization and the meaningful involvement of students and new scholars, by fostering new partnerships, including networks, for research and related activities involving existing and/or potential partners; or
- design and test new partnership approaches for research and/or related activities that may result in best practices or models that either can be adapted by others or have the potential to be scaled up to a regional, national or international level.

Partnerships funding is intended for teams working in formal collaboration between postsecondary institutions and/or organizations of various types.

CIHR Operating Grant: Opioid Crisis Knowledge Synthesis

Deadline: Nov. 21, 2017 (internal); Dec. 5, 2017 (external)

Value: \$110,000 for up to six months

This funding opportunity will support expedited knowledge synthesis grants to rapidly inform policies on opioids related to one or more pillars of the Canadian Drugs and Substances Strategy (i.e. prevention, treatment, harm reduction and enforcement).

CIHR Project Grant

Registration deadline: Jan. 23, 2018 (internal); Feb. 6, 2018 (external)

Value: varies

The Project Grant program is designed to capture ideas with the greatest potential for important advances in fundamental or applied health-related knowledge, the health care system, and/or health outcomes, by supporting projects with a specific purpose and a defined endpoint. The best ideas may stem from new, incremental, innovative, and/or high-risk lines of inquiry or knowledge translation approaches.

Funding Opportunities (internal)

TRU Internal Research Fund

Deadline: Jan. 12, 2018 Value: \$3,000 - \$5,000

These awards are designed to scaffold faculty development, especially in terms of tenure and promotion. The IRF is a small seed fund that is not intended to provide funding for

major projects. New faculty are encouraged to apply.

Community-Driven Research Fund

Deadline: Continuous intake until October 2019, up to 10 awards available Value: \$2,500. Matching Contributions of up to \$2,500 in cash and/or in-kind support is required from the community organization

Funds are still available through the Community-Driven Research Fund, which is designed to support research that responds directly to community needs, builds research partnerships with community organizations in the Thompson Nicola Cariboo region, provides opportunities for students to become involved in community-based research, and helps faculty and their community partners become more competitive for external funding.
