POWER DYNAMICS AND CONSENT

Having power over someone can influence how comfortable they feel saying no to sex – someone may fear negative consequences for not consenting. When someone abuses power over a partner, they may use verbal threats or not. Either way, consent is never possible when someone feels they don't have a choice. ³

Some examples of Imbalances in power can include:

- Age differences and sexual experience
- Level of ability
- Position in society
- Privilege



Sexual consent is an agreement to participate in a sexual activity."

Consent is:

- Freely given. Consenting is a choice you make without pressure, manipulation, or under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Reversible. Anyone can change their mind about what they feel like doing, anytime. Even if you've done it before, and even if you're both naked in bed.
- Informed. You can only consent to something if you have the full story. For example, if someone says they'll use a condom and then they don't, there isn't full consent.
- Enthusiastic. When it comes to sex, you should only do stuff you WANT to do, not things that you feel you're expected to do.
- Specific. Saying yes to one thing (like going to the bedroom to make out) doesn't mean you've said yes to others (like having sex).⁴



Are a "barrier" method of contraception. They are made of very thin latex (rubber), polyurethane or polypropylene and are designed to prevent pregnancy by stopping sperm from meeting an egg. ⁵

INTERNAL CONDOMS

Are a tube of soft plastic (polyurethane) that has a closed end. Each end has a ring or rim. The ring at the closed end is inserted deep into the woman's vagina over the cervix, to hold the tube in place.⁶

Both Internal and External condoms can protect against pregnancy and STIs if used correctly during vaginal, anal and oral sex 7

EMERGENCY CONTRACEPTION

WHAT IS EMERGENCY CONTRACEPTION?

Emergency contraception, or Plan B, is used to prevent pregnancy after unprotected sex or following a contraceptive accident.

An emergency contraceptive is not an abortion pill-if you take an emergency contraceptive, you will not be terminating a pregnancy.

An emergency contraceptive comes in a one-pill dose (levonorgestrel 1.5 mg). If taken within 72 hours (three days) and preferably within 12 hours of a contraceptive accident or unprotected sex.¹⁰

WHERE CAN I GO TO ACCESS EMERGENCY CONTRACEPTION ON CAMPUS?

TRU medical centre provides birth control education and prescribing.

Most insurers, such as TRUSU's Greenshield, cover the cost of your prescription. In cases where you must pay for a prescription up front, keep your receipt and submit a claim.⁹

WHERE CAN I GO TO ACCESS Emergency contraception in Kamloops?

An emergency contraceptive medication is available over the counter. This means that you can access an emergency contraceptive at any pharmacy across B.C. 11



ACCESSING BIRTH Control

WHERE CAN I ACCESS BIRTH CONTROL ON TRU CAMPUS?

Starting April 1st, the B.C. government passed a law that is making contraceptives free for all women, transgender, and non-binary B.C. residents.¹²

This includes:

- oral hormone pills
- contraceptive injections
- copper & hormonal
- intrauterine devices (IUDs)
- subdermal implants
- emergency contraceptive (plan B)

You will still require a prescription to access birth control but will come at a free cost to you. ¹³

The TRU Medical Clinic provides a service of birth control education and prescribing. ⁹



You can make an appointment with a physician by calling the TRU medical clinic!

You may also get birth control from a doctor or a walk-in clinic.

ABORTION FAQs

What is an Abortion?

Abortion is the early ending of a pregnancy.¹⁶

When Should you see a Doctor?

If you think you are pregnant, see a doctor as soon as possible. If you are pregnant, this is an important time to learn your options. The earlier you are in pregnancy, the more options you will likely have.¹⁶ What are the Laws on Abortion in British Columbia?

In B.C., abortion is a publicly funded medical procedure. Every person has the medical right to abortion.¹⁶

Are Abortions Safe?

Abortions that are performed by trained healthcare providers, with the proper equipment, correct technique, and sanitary standards are very safe.¹⁷

HOW DO I ACCESS AN ABORTION IN B.C.?



You do not need a referral from a health care provider or need parental consent to access abortion services.¹⁶

COSTS

There are two types of abortions available in B.C., Medical and Surgical abortion. ¹⁶

MEDICAL ABORTION

Medical abortion pills are free, and available from pharmacies throughout B.C. You will need a prescription from a doctor or NP. Medical abortion is covered under PharmaCare for B.C. residents. ¹⁶

SURGICAL ABORTION

This is provided through abortion clinics, doctors & hospitals. Surgical abortion is covered under the MSP for B.C. residents. ¹⁶

MEDICAL CONSENT

If you are under 19 years old, you can agree to your own medical care. This is called giving consent. You can consent to your own medical care, as long as you are "capable," meaning you understand what the treatment involves, and you understand the risks/benefits if you don't get the treatment, etc. ²⁴

Teenagers (aged 13-19) can access abortion without parental notification or consent. ²⁴

CONFIDENTIALITY

By signing a consent form, you have the right to doctor-patient confidentiality. This means, that your abortion will remain confidential. Some exceptions include: *

- if there is good reason to belive you may harm yourself or others.
- if there is reportable abuse (physical, sexual, or emotional), then the information may not stay private.²⁵

If you are under 19, some doctors may insist on telling a parent/guardian. If you want your medical information to confidential, it is important to tell this directly to your doctor.²⁵





GUARD ME (PRIVATE INSURANCE)

When coming to TRU, international students are automatically enrolled in Guard Me which is a this three-month temporary insurance coverage. The cost for this insurance for one person/month is CAD\$60 payable to TRU.²⁶

MEDICAL SERVICES PLAN

19

(Government insurance)

Enrolment with Medical Services Plan (MSP) is mandatory for all eligible residents (including international students) and their dependents. MSP covers medically required services such as visits to doctors, hospital stays and diagnostic medical testing. There is a three-month waiting period before new residents to BC are eligible for coverage. During this three-month waiting period international students are covered by Guard Me.²⁸

IMPORTANT POINTS: 28

- You must apply for MSP as soon as you arrive in B.C.
- You cannot apply for MSP before you arrive.
- BC MSP coverage will be provided until the expiry date of your study permit.
- Monthly fee of \$75 payable to the government of B.C.

In most cases, you will not have to pay at the time you seek care for medically required services when you show your BC Services Card. ²⁸


